UDOT STICKER PROGRAM

The goal of this program is to promote vehicle safety by pre-inspecting tires to show they have been approved for travel up canyon when the Traction Law is in effect.

TO SIGN UP:

- Choose which tire company you want to visit (see below).
- Fill out the digital form BEFORE you go to the tire shop.
- Then contact the tire shop to make an appointment.

CJ's Pit Stop: MOBILE (New this year)

CJ's Pit Stop is a mobile tire shop that will come to you for sticker program tire inspection. Inspections are by appointment only. Sign up here: https://forms.gle/ukkjE4WD2ndktMCf8

If you have multiple vehicles, please fill out the form for each vehicle. You may use the same email address, but let the inspector know you have multiple vehicles under the same email address.

A reminder that the sticker program is free, completely voluntary, and will run from October 20, 2022 to February 28, 2023. Stickers are NOT REQUIRED to drive Big or Little Cottonwood Canyon. If a vehicle's tires/traction devices meet the requirements, a sticker is placed on the windshield as a way of recognizing that the vehicle has proper traction devices for traveling in the canyons when the Traction Law is in effect.

COSTS ARE GOING UP

PARKING TICKETS. The Town of Brighton raised the parking fine along Highway 190 from \$25 to \$150. Citations will be issued to the owner of the vehicle. It is hoped that the increased fine will encourage drivers to be alert and responsible about where they are parking.



SEWER. Big Cottonwood Canyon Improvement District (BCCID) has proposed a monthly fee increase from \$38/month/ERU* to \$43/ERU/month.

*ERU means Equivalent Residential Unit. Some customers pay more than others because they place greater demand on the system.

1 ERU	\$43/month	up to 3 bedrooms/3baths
1.3 ERUs	\$58/month	4 bedrooms/4baths
1.6 ERUs	\$73/month	5 bedrooms/5baths
2 ERUs	\$86/month	6 bedrooms/6baths

Reasons for the fee increase: Costs for sewage processing have risen substantially in the past 3 years, due to the new sewer treatment plant and increased treatment requirements. Public Comments are welcomed at the Budget Hearing to be held Thursday December 8th @ 6:00PM in the BCCID Office located at 8021 Brighton Loop Road, and virtually: Utah Public Notice Website-utah.gov

TRASH. The Wasatch Front Waste & Recycling District (WFWRD) Is proposing a rate increase:

Full-time residents: Increasing from \$14.75 to \$16.00 per mo.

Seasonal residents: Increasing from \$8.50 to \$9.75 per mo.

Trailer Rental for Bulk: \$190.00 from \$175.00 and Green: \$55.00 from \$45.00.

The last fee increase occurred January 2014 for canyon residents. No increase was imposed for Brighton in 2018 when all other district residents had a fee increase. The 2023 increased fees will help keep up with rapidly rising costs in labor markets, maintenance rates, processing costs at the landfills and recycling facilities, and truck prices to purchase replacement trucks.

There will be a Public Hearing at the WFWRD office, located at 604 W 6960 South on Monday, November 14, at 6 pm to allow public comment on the fee increase.

Tales of the Wasatch

The Brighton Stage Line was owned and operated for many years by Nephi and Ernest Neilson. They hauled freight, passengers, mail, newspapers and food to various stores, inns, mines, and homes in Big Cottonwood Canyon.

The little bus picked up passengers from the Deseret Gym in Salt Lake (next door to the Hotel Utah) and drove them to the Brighton Girls Camp on a daily route from June 1 through Labor Day.

The trip was a delight to all who rode in the 15passenger bus. It was bright yellow with black upholstery. Since it had no windows, canvas protectors could be snapped down in a storm.

The bus always stopped at the stream near the Stairs area for water and to cool the engine. The next stop would be at the Community Camp (later named Spruces) which was built in 1921 on the site of the former Wasatch Tree Nursery. It had tent platforms, a small grocery store, baseball fields, and a log pavilion.

The next stop was the Girl's Friendly Camp operated by Mrs. Godbe and her sister (now known as Camp Tuttle).

The final stop would be at the Brighton Girls Camp

where the bus would stay until it was time to return to the city at sunset.

Passengers could hike all day or camp overnight around Silver Lake. Kids went fishing, swimming, and horseback riding. There was an inn at Brighton called the Balsams, where they held dances in the evening and customers could catch fresh trout from a tank near the front door.

Sometimes bonfires were built in a large open area where residents and guests would gather round in the evening to sing and play music. Stella Nielsen remembered roasting potatoes in the bonfires, taffy pulls, and dancing to the music of a fiddle and an accordion. Anyone in the canyon was welcome to join the fun.
